new release there is a perplexing question christians don t usually know how to answer why do the jewish people reject christ so strongly in this book dr bar goes beyond his personal experiences and uses extensive research to investigate the historical theological cultural and psychological factors that inhibit jews from accepting jesus christ as their messiah he examines how judaism initially boring christianity evolved into a faith that contradicts and is hostile to christianity aimed at educating christian believers the book takes readers on a captivating exploration of the intricate relationship between judaism and christianity this book written from the unique perspective of an israeli jewish believer in jesus provides

in september 2002 twenty one prominent catholic and protestant scholars released the groundbreaking document a sacred obligation which includes ten statements about jewish christian dialogue focused around a guiding claim revising christian teaching about judaism and the jewish people is a central and indispensable obligation of theology in our time following the worldwide reception of their document the authors have expanded their themes into seeing judaism anew the essays in this volume offer a conceptual framework by which christians can rethink their understanding of the church s relationship to judaism and show how essential it is that christians represent judaism accurately not only as a matter of justice for the jewish people but also for the integrity of christian faith by linking new testament scholarship to the shoah christian liturgical life and developments in the church this volume addresses the important questions at the heart of christian identity such as are only christians saved why did jesus die why is israel so important to jews and what should we think about the conflict in the middle east how is christianity complicit in the holocaust what is important about jesus being a jew

i accept the resurrection of jesus not as an invention of the community of disciples but as an historical event Ó when a leading orthodox jew makes such a declaration its significance can hardly be overstated pinchas lapide is a rabbi and theologian who has specialized in the study of the new testament in this book he convincingly shows that an irreducible minimum of experience underlies the new testament account of the resurrection however much of the details of the narrative may be open to objection he maintains that life after death is part of the jewish faith experience and that it is jesus messiahship not his resurrection which marks the division between christianity and judaism dr lapide quotes moises maimonides the greatest jewish thinker in his support all these matters which refer to jesus of nazareth only served to make the way free for the king messiah and to prepare the whole world for the worship of god with a united heart Ó

for christians the old testament is mysterious and often unexplored this book offers a broad yet basic study of judaism for christians who are

curious about the origins of their faith the entire bible and every one of its authors were jewish jesus was a jewish teacher and his apostles were jewish jesus spoke primarily to a jewish audience this study will seek to answer questions like who is a jew do all jews share the same beliefs why don't jews believe that jesus was the messiah when did jews become christians christians muslims and jews all look to abraham as their father both christians and jews look to abraham isaac and jacob as our forefathers sarah rebecca rachel and Leah are our matriarchs these are our common ancestors god chose a people through who a messiah could come no other jew in history has rivaled jesus in the magnitude of his influence the words and deeds of jesus the jew have been and are an inspiration to countless millions of men and women this study will explore how jews pray readers will also explore how some of the jewish prayer rituals are in practice in christian churches everywhere communion has its roots in the jewish blessings over wine and bread at the last supper jesus the jew took two of the most common prayers to instruct his disciples to remember him the christian call to confession has its roots in yom kippur the jewish high holy day of atonement you can see baptism in the jewish mikveh the ritual bath as you might guess jews and christians look at the meaning of the messiah differently there is much messianic prophecy in jewish scripture this reader will guide christians in their understanding that jews look at the messiah as more a question of what not who in jewish holy days and festivals readers will explore shabbat the sabbath day it has been said more than the jews have kept the sabbath the sabbath has kept the jews the sabbath is on

a jewish believer himself dr michael l brown provides clear answers to questions about modern and historical jewish practices he also addresses questions christians have about their own relationship to the old testament law such as should christians observe the sabbath on saturday and are gentile christians spiritual jews

is it possible that early christian anti judaism was directed toward people other than jews michele murray proposes that significant strands of early christian anti judaism were directed against gentile christians more specifically it was directed toward gentile christian judaizers these were christians who combined a commitment to christianity with adherence in varying degrees to jewish practices without viewing such behaviour as contradictory several christian leaders thought that these community members dangerously blurred the boundaries between christianity and judaism as such gentile christian judaizers became the target of much anti jewish rhetoric in various early christian writings evidence of gentile christian judaizers can be found in canonical sources such as paul's letter to the galatians and the book of revelation as well as non canonical sources such as the epistle of barnabas the didache and justin martyr's dialogue with trypho in order to compare the phenomenon of judaizing and the reaction to it of ecclesiastical authorities murray organizes the evidence by probable geographical location using asia minor and syria as the two

main loci the phenomenon of gentile christian judaizing is examined within the broader context of jewish christian relations in the early centuries and is the first attempt to draw all possible references to gentile christian judaizers together into one study to consider them as a whole this discussion invites readers to reflect on the existence of gentile christian judaizers as another point on the continuum of jewish christian relations in the greco roman world an area murray concludes that needs to be more carefully defined

the fourth gospel is at the same time a sublime work that has inspired and enriched the faith of countless christians and a problematic text that has provided potent anti jewish imagery exploited in anti jewish and anti semitic discourse over the course of two millennia the fourth gospel contains approximately 70 references to hoi ioudaioi a designation most often and best translated as the jews several of these references are neutral or descriptive referring to jewish festivals or specific practices and some depict individual jews or jewish groups as interested in jesus message the vast majority however express a negative or even hostile stance towards the jews these passages express several themes that became central to christian anti jewish and anti semitic discourse these include the charge of deicide killing god and the claim that the jews have the devil as their father 8 44 the essays in this book address both the gospel s stance towards the jews and the gospel s impact on jewish christian relations from antiquity to the present day in a range of media including sermons iconography art music and film a short volume of collected essays cannot hope to address the full history of the fourth gospel s impact on jewish christian relations nevertheless it is hoped that this volume will contribute to the efforts of christians and jews alike to find ways to appreciate what is good and life affirming about the gospel of john while also acknowledging the damaging impact of its portrayal of jews as the children of satan and the killers of christ only when christians disavow this portrayal can the gospel of john continue to be a true source of inspiration and perhaps even a path forward in the relationships between jews and christians in the modern world

jewish christianity is a contested category in current research but for precisely this reason it may offer a powerful lens through which to rethink the history of jewish christian relations traditionally jewish christianity has been studied as part of the origins and early diversity of christianity collecting revised versions of previously published articles together with new materials annette yoshiko reed reconsiders jewish christianity in the context of late antiquity and in conversation with jewish studies she brings further attention to understudied texts and traditions from late antiquity that do not fit neatly into present day notions of christianity as distinct from judaism in the process she uses these materials to probe the power and limits of our modern assumptions about religion and identity

the christian affirmation of a triune god has always perplexed and confounded jews can jews get beyond understanding the trinity as inherently tri theistic a jewish trinity serves as an entrance into a range of issues in jewish christian theological difference presenting a jewish understanding of six topics in contemporary christian theology trinity original sin incarnation salvation messianism and covenant in a jewish trinity alan brill seeks a

jewish appreciation for the core theological differences between the two religions the book is informed by recent historical studies of the early jewish christian division showing greater commonality in theological ideas the book however concentrates on contemporary christian theology especially the constructive theology of karl rahner and jürgen moltmann to demonstrate that contemporary christian theological formulations possess greater affinity to jewish conceptions than did prior christian theology while also still providing religious difference this work of comparative theology is a crucial next step in jewish christian encounter for our historically informed post polemical age brill shows that jews and christians can engage in comparative discourse on theological issues with full clarity and understanding the book seeks to change the field of jewish christian encounter going beyond reconciliation toward a richer and deeper theological discussion of similarity and difference

the interactions of the jewish christian and muslim communities over centuries have often been hostile and sometimes violent this book discusses the essential and critical issues in each tradition s views of god and of the earth and humanity
